Corduroy

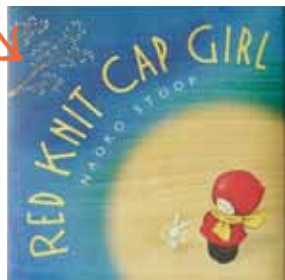
by Don Freeman

Bears would run down stairs! A fun romp.



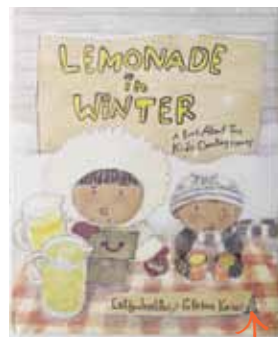
The Snowy Day

Who says you can't have a lemonade stand in winter? (Gives a math boost to boot.)

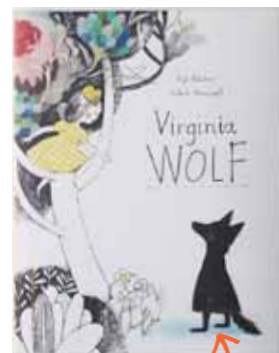


Where the Wild Things Are
